The poems discussed in this paper are written by the authors who belong to different countries. For instance, Aharon Shabtai who is an Israeli poet and translator wrote about his country's plight aftermath of war in ecological perspective. Likewise, the writers such as Mullai Musrifa, S.Pathmanathan's (Sopa) disclose the environmental calamity of war. This study traces the theoretical perspective of man-environment relations. The logical argument is constructed upon the interrelated themes of the poems. The approach used in this study is Ecocriticism that investigates underlying ecological value in the literary texts.
