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This book of TEA POEMS by Geetha Sukumaran and P. Ahilan has exclusive flavours of life experienced in India and Sri Lanka. Love lingers like the soft foggy steam unravelling colours of relationships as the metaphor of sipping tea or engaging with tea making is spiced up with women histories, domestic violence, political wars, love, pain and resistance. Here, 'Each gulp of tea is a ripple, a resistance'.

Local tea drinking habits are reflected in the crispiness of a poem. Disputes about land, nation, and nationalities are portrayed over a cup of tea, pouring references of political insurgencies into the reader's cup. 'Melting memories of the body' leave residues at the bottom of an emptied cup. "I walk into tea / Where the lane ends, there is no field / Where is my village?"

TEA experienced in these poems is beyond geographical constraints, leaps beyond borders, breaks boundaries, making these poems highly political with reference to bodies of land juxtaposed with human bodies.

An impressive cover and beautiful works of art by Vaidheki not only bind these short poems that speak of a time that we live in, but also keeps reminding the reader that these poems are about TEA!
